David J. W. Boney was born on January 14th, 1815 in Duplin County, North Carolina. His father was born in North Carolina and his mother was born in Virginia. On Jan. 18, 1841, at Ft. McComb, Florida, David enlisted as a private in the company commanded by Capt. Hicks in the Regiment of Mounted Men commanded by Col. Dancy. He was taken sick soon after he was mustered into service. In the battle of Sanfalasco Hammock, David fell over a log and injured his lungs. This injury was to cause him trouble the rest of his life. When his company was sent to Dead Man's Bay, David J. W. Boney was left at Ft. McComb without any protection or supplies except as he could get from the citizens. As soon as he was able to ride, David traveled to Newnansville to see if any of the doctors could help him. Meanwhile, his company returned to Ft. McComb and were discharged. When David returned to Ft. McComb and applied for his pay, he found out that he had been reported as a deserter, and lost his pay.

In the mid-1840's, David J. W. Boney moved into south Florida settling in Hillsborough County. On Oct. 8, 1846, he married Lydia A. Whidden. She was born in Columbia County, Florida on Sept. 27, 1831, daughter of Maxfield & Sophia (Crews) Whidden. Most records give her name as "Lydia A." but Salem Baptist Church minutes give her name as "Elizabeth", as does the 1850 Hills. Co. census. Children:

- 1. Sophia M. Boney, born July 4, 1847, married Nathan Lowe
- 2. Cornelius M. Boney, born 1849, married Martha Jane McClelland, daughter of Moses Andrew & Sarah (Platt) McClelland.

David J. W. Boney and family were living in Hillsborough County in 1850 in the Thonotosassa Settlement. Some of their neighbors were Frederic Varn, Peter Platt, John Skipper, Rabon Raulerson and Eli Whitton.

In December of 1850, D. J. W. Boney and his wife "Elizabeth" Boney joined the Salem Baptist Church at Ichepucksassa near present day Plant City. On Oct. 24, 1855, David applied for bounty land based on his service in Capt. Hicks' company. William Hall, aged 38 years, who was a Second Lieutenant in Capt. Hicks' company testified that David J. W. Boney was mustered into the company.

On August 27, 1855, David Boney was mustered into Capt. F. M. Durrance's Company in the Third Seminole Indian War. While in this service, he was treated for his bleeding lungs and chronic diarrhea at Ft. Simon Drum, Ft. "Fraisher", Newnansville & Black Creek, Fla. He was mustered out in December of 1857. He also served in Capt. Leroy G. Lesley's company during this war.

About 1858, David J. W. Boney settled in the Fort Hartsuff-Popash area of Manatee County. On April 18, 1859, he was among a group of Manatee citizens who reported for jury duty. In 1860, he was selected as County Commissioner for Manatee County. Some of his neighbors in 1860 were Moses McClendin, D. D. Crews, David Summeral, William A. Williams and Ely Whiddon.

David Boney enrolled Apr. 20, 1864 at Fort Myers under Capt. James D. Green in Company B, 2nd Florida Cavalry, U. S. Army. He was promoted to 1st Corpl. on May 28, 1864. He was home on sick furlough in 1865 when the war ended.

On October 20, 1869, David was a delegate from New Hope Baptist Church to the 3rd Annual session of the South Florida Baptist Association held at Shiloh Church, Hillsborough County. This was the year that New Hope Baptist Church joined the association. Mr. Boney also

represented his Church at the association meetings in 1870, 1871, 1872 and 1875. He 1872 he was a member of the Committee on Letters.

In 1870, David J. W. Boney was living in Township 34 in the Popash area along with Nathan Lowe and John Wood. David was a Justice of the Peace in Manatee County in the 1870's and 1880's and performed many

marriages during that period.

On October 5, 1880, David purchased from the Internal Improvement Fund of the State of Florida, 120 acres at \$.80 per acre. This land was described as the SW1 of the NW1 and the West2 of the SW1 of Section 17 in Township 34 South, Range 26 East. On this same date, he also purchased 40 additional acres for \$1.00 an acre. This was described as the SE of the NE of Section 19, T-34S, R-26E. On July 15, 1882, David J. W. Boney bought 40 more acres from the State of Florida, at \$1.00 per acre. This parcel was described as the SEt of the NW of Section 17, T-34S, R-26E.

In 1885, David's mother-in-law, Sophie Whidden, age 81 and his nephew, D. W. Boney, age 8, were living with him and his wife. David

served as Postmaster at Popash for several years.

David J. W. Boney died on May 4, 1889 of kidney disease, at his homestead at Popash. His property included: 97 cattle, 2 horses, 246 sheep, 2 yoke of oxen, 1 wagon, 10 hogs and 190 acres of land. He

was buried at New Hope Cemetery.

On May 24, 1890, Mrs. Lydia A. Boney applied for a pension based on her husband's services during the Indian Wars. She gave her post office as Zolfo Springs, DeSoto County, Florida. Lydia died on Jan. 23, 1910. In her will dated May 26, 1909, she left to C. M. Boney the SE $\frac{1}{2}$ of NW $\frac{1}{2}$ and W $\frac{1}{2}$ of SW $\frac{1}{2}$ of S-17, T-34, R-26 and 75 head of cattle branded XB ranging near Popash. She gave Sophia Lowe five dollars. Mrs. Boney may have remarried. When she applied for the Letters of Administration on her husband's estate, she was listed as L. A. Boney, widow, now L. A. Russell. But her estate and will was probated as Lydia A. Boney.

TIMOTHY ALDERMAN FAMILY BIBLE

This was a very large, old fashioned type of Bible, with heavy enbossed cover, unmistakably a very old Bible, but there was no date shown. In 1949 it was in the possession of Mrs. Eunice (Alderman) Acree of Tiger Bay, Polk County, Fla., a daughter of Michael and Civility Alderman and granddaughter of Timothy & Zilpha Louise (Lastinger) Alderman. The Bible was copied on Mar. 10, 1949 by Miss Lillian Carpenter at the home of Mrs. Acree. A typed copy is in the Alderman family file at the Polk County Historical Library, Bartow, Fla.

Joseph Underhill, a son of William and Spisa Underhill, was born in Duplin County, North Carolina, about 1795. William had served in the

Revolution as a private in the North Carolina Militia.

About 1810, Joseph Underhill moved to Bulloch County, Georgia and during the War of 1812, he served as a second lieutenant in the Georgia Volunteer Company of Capt. Lemuel Tippins. On April 13, 1815, in Bulloch County, Georgia, Joseph Underhill was married to Nancy Hilliard, daughter of Silas and Abegail (Bulloch) Hilliard. Nancy was born about 1797 in Georgia. Their children:

- Mary "Polly" Underhill, born April 10, 1816; died April 7, 1904; 1. married Benjamin Guy.
- 2. William Underhill, born May 20, 1821; died Feb. 13, 1905; married Samantha Chandler, April 25, 1865.
- 3. John Underhill, born 1823; married Keziah Tucker, Sept. 11, 1854.
- 4. Thomas Underhill, born 1825; died Feb. 20, 1864; married Rebecca Thompson, Nov. 2, 1852.
- Spicy Underhill, born 1832; married 1st, George Jones, Feb. 9, 1852; 5. married 2nd, Bennett Whidden, Oct. 28, 1858.
- Barbara E. "Barbary" Underhill, born 1834; died Nov. 28, 1914; married 1st, Francis A. Ivey, Nov. 1850; married 2nd, James Thomas in November of 1877 (see SOUTH FLORIDA PIONEERS, Issue #12).
- Levicy Underhill, born March 16, 1838; died Oct. 17, 1902; married 1st, Jeremiah Underhill (1st cousin), March 13, 1859; married 2nd, Noah Whidden, March 3, 1864; married 3rd, Thomas Sullivan, Oct. 24. 1867.
- Matthew Underhill, born Dec. 4, 1840; died March 16, 1918; married 1st, Elizabeth Catledge, Sept. 25, 1873; married 2nd, Isabella Surrency, Nov. 19, 1879.

Joseph Underhill served in his local militia unit while a resident of Bulloch County and in 1820 he participated in the Georgia Land Lottery. By 1838, Joseph was living in Ware County, for on June 9th of that year he was mustered into Capt. James Sweat's company of militia in order to repel the invasion of Indians. He served until Aug. 19, 1838. He then reenlisted, serving until Dec. 21, 1838, being mustered The 1840 census shows Joseph and family reout at Fort Floyd, Ga. siding in Ware County.

Prior to 1850, Joseph Underhill and family moved to Hillsborough County, Florida, and are shown living there on the 1850 census. moving to Hillsborough County about the same time were Joseph's wife's sister, Annie (Hilliard) Willingham, her husband William, and Benjamin

Hilliard, brother of Joseph's wife.
A United States land map, prepared in 1855, of Township 31 South, Range 25 East, shows an Underhill family residing in Section 13, on the east side of Peas Creek, about 3 miles northeast of Fort Meade. This same Underhill homestead can also be found on Ives 1856 military map of south Florida. It was the home of Joseph Underhill and his bachelor

son William.

During the Third Seminole War, Joseph Underhill served in Capt. Durrance's company, Florida Mounted Volunteers, joining Dec. 29, 1855 and serving until Aug. 22, 1856. He later served in another company commanded by Capt. Durrance from March 11, 1858 until May 10, 1858.

After the close of the Indian war in 1858, Joseph's brother-in-law, William H. Willingham, moved into the Kissimmee Island section of eastern Hillsborough County. About the same time, Joseph Underhill and son William also moved to Kissimmee Island. The Underhills and Willinghams do not appear on the 1860 census for Hillsborough County. Obviously, the census taker did not travel to the isolated Kissimmee Island area to record the few families who had settled there. In 1861, Hillsborough County was divided, the eastern portion becoming Polk County. A tax list compiled for Polk County that year lists Joseph Underhill, William Underhill and William Willingham as taxpayers.

During the Civil War, Joseph's four sons all served the Confederate cause. William and Matthew were members of Munnerlyn's Cattle Guard Battalion, John served in the regular Confederate army in Company E, 7th Florida Infantry, and Thomas was a Confederate leader in the Peas

Creek area and was killed by Union troops in 1864.

Joseph Underhill continued to appear on Polk County tax lists in 1862, 1867, 1869, 1870 and 1877. In the 1880 census he is shown residing in Manatee County living next to his daughter, Barbary (Underhill) Thomas. The census shows him as 85 years of age and a veteran of the War of 1812. On April 3, 1880, Joseph applied for a U. S. pension based upon his service in the War of 1812, and gave his post office address as Pine Level, Manatee County. A letter written in support of the application by P. T. Tucker of Pine Level to the Commissioner of Pensions on Dec. 4, 1880 says "The claim of Joseph Underhill for Pension and Land Warrant for War 1812-1815 is a good claim the old man is now helpless and 85 years old and is living on the charity of his connexion (sic) and if any body needs it, it is him please push this up. . . . " The plea was to no avail for the claim was rejected March 23, 1881. Joseph Underhill must have died soon after this for he does not appear on the 1885 state census for Manatee County.

A; born in Jackson County, Florida; enlisted Feb. 9, 1863 at Key West, age 22; refugee from Confederacy; black hair, black eyes, dark complexion, 5'8½"; captured by enemy while on picket at Fort Myers on Feb. 20, 1865; joined company from missing since action, Sept. 27, 1865; wounded in leg while endeavoring to make his escape from prison.

JAMES D. BUTLER, Co. C; born in New Hanover County, North Carolina; enlisted July 11, 1864 at Cedar Keys, age 36; occupation - blacksmith; refugee from Confederacy; blue eyes, brown hair, fair complexion, 6'2"; promoted to Sgt. on Mar. 16, 1865.

ALEXANDER B. CALLAHAN, Co. A; born in Greenville District, South Carolina; enlisted June 1, 1864 at Fort Myers, age 45; refugee from Confederacy; gray eyes, gray hair, dark complexion, 6°2"; promoted to 2nd M-Sgt. on June 17, 1864; promoted to 1st Sgt. on July 24, 1864.

WILLIAM J. CAMPBELL, Co. B; born in Green County, Kentucky; enlisted June 15, 1864 at Fort Myers, age 44; refugee from Confederacy; gray eyes, gray hair, dark complexion, 5'9".

BERRIAN CANNON, Co., D, F; born in Lotchoway (Alachua) County, Florida; enlisted April 20, 1864 at Key West, age 18; refugee from Confederacy; gray eyes, reddish brown hair, fair complexion, 6'½".

John Franklin Willis was born on May 26, 1839 in Blakely, Early Co., Georgia, the eldest child of Joab and Adeline (Weathers) Willis. There being no public schools prior to 1873, he received his education at Blakely Academy. He served as assistant to the teacher at the Academy

in 1859-1860.

After the outbreak of the Civil War, he enlisted in the Early County Home Guards on July 8, 1861, this unit later becoming Company G, 13th Georgia Regiment. Subsequently, he was elected an officer in Company A, 51st Georgia Regiment. This company was made up of four officers and 137 men from the Early Volunteers. He fought with the Army of Northern Virginia and served the Confederacy until the end of the war when he returned home to Blakely.

On Dec. 23, 1866, John married Frances Matilda Jane Vann, a former student of Blakely Academy. She was born on Sept. 4, 1845 in Blakely, a daughter of James and Matilda (Collier) Vann. Both the Vann and Collier families were long time residents of Early County and were planters, an

occupation also chosen by John Willis.

John Willis was elected Sheriff of Early County in 1871, serving for two years and then resigning. Family tradition states that he chose giving up his job rather than locking up a farmer's corn crib for non-

payment of a debt.

In the latter part of 1875, John moved his family to the Kissimmee River Valley area of Florida. They were residing in Orange County when, on Jan. 8, 1876, Frances Willis granted power of attorney to her father-in-law back in Early County for disposing of her property interests in Georgia. In the fall of 1876, John Willis homesteaded 160 acres in a small settlement located in what was then part of Brevard County, but in 1887 became part of Osceola County, Fla. Later known as Lokosee, the settlement was located near Blue Cypress Creek off present Highway 441 about two miles from Yeehaw Junction. According to final proof of homesteading filed on June 6, 1890, he constructed a log home and corn crib, planted an orange grove and farmed eight acres. A school was also conducted there where Mrs. Willis taught their children.

John was the first postmaster at Algers, being appointed on Nov. 17, 1898 when the post office was established there. The postal service was discontinued on April 30, 1907, and future mail went to Olney. The service resumed on Dec. 6, 1911 and the name was changed to Lokosee on Nov. 5, 1914. John Willis was postmaster at his death in 1904 and his son, Robert, was appointed first postmaster of Lokosee in 1914. Until recent years, a highway sign marked the site of Lokosee. Now, the old settlement no longer exists on maps and the sign has been removed.

John and Frances Willis raised a family of six daughters and one son at their old homestead. Their firstborn, a son, died before their move

to Florida. Their children were:

- 1. John Francis Willis, born 1868 at Blakely, Ga.; died 1872 at Blakely.
- 2. Osteen Willis, born 1870 at Blakely, Ga; married 1st, on Aug. 24, 1889 Allen Padgett, son of Tippen & Louisa (Alverez) Padgett; married 2nd, Walter Bebee.
- 3. California Matilda Willis, born Apr. 26, 1871 at Blakely, Ga.; died July 6, 1946; married on June 20, 1890, David Washington Cayson, son of John and Hannah Myantha (Gillett) Cayson.

- 4. Florence Emma Willis, born Sept. 29, 1874 at Blakely, Ga.; died April 1945; married 1st, John Runey on Aug. 5, 1893; married 2nd, Noah Yates on Dec. 25, 1896.
- 5. Rosa Lee Willis, born April 22, 1875 at Blakely, Ga.; died Mar. 5, 1902; married on Aug. 14, 1896 Smith J. Drawdy.
- 6. Vandalia Ella Willis, born July 29, 1877 at Algers, Fla.; died 1961; married 1st, James Tippen Padgett, son of Elijah & Charity (Hunter) Padgett; married 2nd, Mr. Boatwright.
- 7. Montague Adeline Willis, born April 22, 1879 at Algers, Fla.; died Nov. 14, 1936; married on Dec. 23, 1897, Thomas Guilford Hair, son of Streaty Hair, Sr. and Lydia (Crews) Hair.
- 8. Robert Willis, born Aug. 17, 1882 at Algers, Fla.; died June 3, 1963; married 1st Mary Pike on July 6, 1905; married 2nd, Rebecca Padgett, daughter of Tippen and Louisa (Alverez) Padgett

John Franklin Willis died on August 23, 1904 and Frances Jane Willis (Known as "Fannie") died on October 17, 1919. Both are buried in marked graves at the old homestead in a fence enclosed plot. The little cemetery has two other small fenced plots that once had log markers on the graves, now long gone. It isn't known who is buried in the unmarked graves.

JAMES HAYMAN 1803-1873

James Hayman was born in Georgia c1803, son of Henry Hayman. He married Delila Martin on Jan. 24, 1822 in Bryan County, Georgia at her father, James Martin's house. Their children:

- 1. Jeremiah Madison Hayman, born Dec. 28, 1822 in Bryan County, Ga.; married in Alachua County on Aug. 27, 1846, Martha Jane Carlton, daughter of Alderman & Martha Maria (Alderman) Carlton.
- 2. James H. Hayman, born Dec. 6, 1829
- 3. Rebecca Hayman, born 1833
- 4. Martha Hayman, born Sept. 21, 1834
- 5. Mary Hayman, born 1836
- 6. Emma C. Hayman, born May 30, 1839, married ______ Blackshear
- 7. William C. Hayman, born Nov. 24, 1841; married on Dec. 14, 1865

Mrs. Sarah (Carlton) Hooker, daughter of Alderman & Martha Maria (Alderman) Carlton and widow of Stephen P. Hooker.

- 8. Delila Jane Hayman, born Sept. 30, 1844; married _____ Johnson.
- 9. Sebron (Seaborn) Goodall Hayman, born Sept. 30, 1846; married on Feb. 17, 1868 in Polk County, Edna Dishong.
- 10. Emanuel Martin Hayman, born April 24, 1849; married on Apr. 12, 1888 in Polk County, Mrs. Annie Elizabeth (Sturges) Bunch.
- 11. Lavina Anne Hayman, born Feb. 5, 1855; married John Chapman.

James Hayman and his family lived in Bryan County, Georgia about 30 miles west of Savannah. James enlisted as a private in the company commanded by Capt. M. C. Livingston in the Regiment of U. S. Volunteers commanded by Col. William Bailey. He enlisted at San Pedro in Madison County, Florida in March of 1837 and served until Sept. 15, 1837 when he was mustered out at Ft. Brooke. At the time of his enlistment, he was described as 5'10" with blue eyes, black hair and light complexion. In October of 1837, James Hayman moved his family to Madison County and he remained a resident of Florida for the rest of his life. He served three more enlistments during the Indian Wars: Feb. 12, 1838 to Aug. 12, 1838; Aug. 12, 1838 to Nov. 12, 1838; and from Aug. 19, 1839 to Sept. 20, 1839 - name of commander not given.

The Hayman family moved to the present day Hernando County area in 1841. James received 160 acres of land under the Armed Occupation Act. It was described as follows: "Beginning at a corner on a stake and running due north forty chains to a corner, thence running due east forty chains to a corner, thence running due south forty chains to a corner, thence running due west forty chains to the place of beginning. Being in about a mile & a half N. N. E. of Lake Lindsey and in about three quarters of a mile of Scott's Road and between seven and eight miles of Chicuchatta Settlement." The registration was dated Feb. 27, 1843.

In October of 1850, James Hayman applied for and received a bounty land warrant for 160 acres in Hernando County. He moved to Polk County about 1868 living in the Bartow and Homeland areas. He died at Homeland on Oct. 16, 1873 from a long and severe case of chronic articular rheumatism involving both bladder and kidney. A. Smoot Johnston was the attending physician. He was buried in the Oak Hill cemetery at Bartow.

Mrs. Delila Hayman lived with her children at Bartow in Polk County and at Owens in DeSoto County. She applied for and received a pension of \$8.00 a month based on her husband's service in Capt. Livingston's Company during the Indian Wars. Mrs. Hayman died at Floral City on March 31, 1894, aged 87 years.

GARRETT MURPHY

The following article was written and contributed by Mrs. Ruby Cason Iliff of N-2506 Denver, Spokane, Washington 99207.

A most valued friend once said to me, "A fool will never change his mind, but a wise man will". I may never be considered as judicious as the hero of this sketch, even though I've changed my mind many times concerning the writing of it. Not that my interest in the project waned, but because of my inability to do him justice caused my hand to falter.

From the very beginning of his long and turbulent life, Garrett "Dink" Murphy, met and conquered life's problems and radiated into the lives of his fellow man the adage, "I am the master of my fate and the

captain of my soul".

Garrett, or Uncle Dink, Murphy, as he was commonly and affectionately known, was born the only child and son of Susan Lee Cason and Arnold Murphy. Susan Lee Cason was the daughter of Silas and Abigail (Iangford) Cason. Records differ as to her birth place, but it is believed that she was born the 20th of October 1830 in Lowndes County, Georgia - that being the home of her parents in 1830 where they were registered as charter members of the Columbia Primitive Baptist Church.

Garrett Murphy was born 14 Jan. 1850 in Madison County, Florida. Because of his being no bigger than a large sized lobster at birth and very puny in his adolescence, the nick name of Dink for dinky, meaning small, was given him which lasted his entire life. This description was not indicative of him as a grown man however, for he grew and developed to a larger than ordinary stature of man, and the tallness of his soul was equal to his great physical height.

It has been remembered by Samuel Garrett Murphy, grandson of Garrett Murphy, and bearer of his famous father's and grandfather's name, that at the peak of Garrett's career as a cattle man, he often made the remark, "that when he was cow hunting he was sorry for the horse, but when he got into the pen to catch calves, he was glad of his weight". Uncle Marion Postell Carlton, half-brother of Garrett Murphy, said, "I was always considered a large man, but Dink was much larger than

myself. He was a man among men". Oh, how I've wished so many times that I had talked longer and recorded some of the homey philosophy and wisdom of Grandpa Murphy; but most of what I am relating to you now was told to me by Grandpa before he died in 1934. This is a common fault with all of us. Life flies on wings of lightening, and while our loved ones are near us, we bask in the revelry of thoughtlessness and all too soon we would that we too had preserved for our posterity, that link in family tradition and history so priceless to all. Mr. Sartain, in his colorful "History of Walker County, Georgia" says, "that every piece of information concerning an ancestor is important and valuable". He further suggests that some competant person should be appointed historian, whose duty it is to make and keep a short but concise history of the family. In the course of years, this history might be published and handed down to the next succeeding generation. True, when we are young, and life's morn seems rosy and beautiful, we think and care little for the family history and tradition, but as we grow older in years and become more settled and thoughtful, our minds revert to our forefathers and we begin to ask about them and their surroundings. Every head of a family should carefully prepare in some permanent form, a concise and accurate account of his life, and leave it to his children with the request that it be preserved for future references, and request all the children to make additions to it from time to time. In this way an account and accurate history of the family would grow up in a few generations. Who of us, especially those advanced in years, would not be delighted if we were able to sit down and read some readable history of our loved ones back a few generations? Even though we might, and probably would, run across some dark spots, some black sheep, for who of us, I say again, is perfect.

Garrett Murphy did not remember his father, Arnold Murphy, for a separation came between his parents when he was very small. His father died when Garrett was only five years old, and in 1856 his mother married the Reverend John Wright Carlton, and young Garrett grew up with his beloved half brothers and sisters. It was the great privilege of these children to grow up in a religious atmosphere. They were reared around the family alter where they heard the gospel songs and reading of the holy scriptures, and where very earnest prayers ascended unto God. These invaluable parental influences crystalized in the thinking of young Garrett, and when he became the head of a household and the dutiful parent of six girls and two boys, he too, insisted on family prayer, and it became a ritual with him and his children, that who ever was visiting his home, preacher or horse thief before anyone went to the table to eat, Garrett Murphy would read the Bible (in the living room) and each knelt by his or her chair while

Grandpa prayed for guidance, and gave thanks for everything.

At fourteen years of age, Garrett weighed one hundred and sixty-five pounds, being very large for his age, and the spirit of adventure in his veins, he ran away from home to "join up" in the Confederate Army. It was his intention to follow his uncle, a brother of his mothers to war. He had not gone far before he found him. Garrett was taken under the wing of his uncle until such time as the troops could meet a railroad. While in camp, the young, but, would be patriot, served his country by washing the dishes of the soldiers.
